Corinne and Larry Sainsbury, long-time members of St. Andrew's died within two days of each other in early January. After more than 70 years of marriage one might think that God called them home together because he realized they could not live without each other. They were a devoted couple who left three children, seven grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren behind to grieve their passing.

They were married in Moncton, NB in August 1946 and thereafter lived in various cities in Eastern Canada as well as periods in England and Washington, DC. Larry retired from the position of Director of Engineering at head office of Canada Post in Ottawa in 1985. It was then they decided to retire to Victoria.

Due to their mutual love of books, retirement for Larry and Corinne meant opening "Yesteryear Books" on Fort St. which they operated for more than 10 years. They were also active members of St. Andrew's. They were both regular contributors to and workers at the annual bazaar at our church, working hard to organize and prepare the "treasures" for sale. Chocolate Chimes

This is the name that a team of students from Camosun College Interurban gave their project as they worked on a way to restore life to St. Andrew's chimes. Recently Duncan Mackinnon sent a brochure entitled "Chocolate Chimes" to the Link. The leaflet details the efforts of the four students and tells the history of the chimes and how an upgrade would benefit St. Andrew's Church.

After the death of Charles 'Candy' Rogers, founder of Rogers Chocolates in 1927 (yes, that is where the chocolate connection comes in) his wife Leah had a set of Deagan Church chimes installed at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. The chimes were disabled in 1965 because of electrical and mechanical breakdowns.

The Camosun team of Bryce Gammon (Damper/PCB Design), Martin Yong (Coding/Technical Writing), Robert Kirkwood (Circuit Design/Assembly) and Kieran Lauridsen (Pneumatics/Striker Design) wanted to restore functionality to the chimes so Victorians and others could hear again the dulcet tones of the chimes.

By replacing the old electromechanical system, Chocolate Chimes has devised a cheaper, sturdier, and easier way to maintain the system. Utilizing some of the old parts such as the original electromagnet core and introducing newer technologies, the team has made the system easier to use. "Using a computer interface controlled by a micro-controller, you can select any song to play with the click of a button and program your own songs through the MIDI (**M**usical Instrument

Digital Interface) editor" so you do not need someone to be physically playing the chimes.

The system consists of three parts: the pneumatic striker, the electromagnetic damper and the MIDI control system. The pneumatic system is guaranteed for years. Matching the firing strength and the velocity of the original, the self-lubricating striker rails are contained in a corrosiveresistant housing. "The damper uses springs to press a metal plate against the bells, [and] then the refurbished electromagnet pulls down the plate to let the bell ring."

Thank you, Duncan, for the information on this interesting project. Duncan's accompanying email to the LINK (below) explains how the work done by the Camosun students came about and where things stand at the moment.

... Camosun College students did, as their final project, demonstrate a method that could be used to restore the St. Andrew's Chimes so that they would ring again using new technology. On completion of the project the chimes could be played from software files loaded on our computer and the system would be driven from a small air compressor and simple relays. This project was kindly funded by the college at no cost to St.

Andrew's. Although this was a project to prove the concept, it is hoped that next year a new team will pick up where the first team left off. The full design would be complete with drawings and a bill of material and signed off by a professional Engineer so that tradesmen could easily install the full system.

This pilot project will have an 18-month run and if it isn't a revenue producing or neutral project it will be taken out of the budget. It was felt that this was not a project that can be taken on by volunteers; we need a company or persons that have a clear idea of what charitable organizations/arts groups are looking for in terms of short term rental space. We are very grateful that St. Andrew's has been the beneficiary of several estates that allow us to have some financial stability in this time of transition. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to call on an elder or the Treasurer for clarification.

We will be participating in Car Free Day on June 17, 2018, marking our third year of participation. Jim Ferguson will be looking for your ideas and participation in the near future. Please mark the date on your calendar.

Session received the resignation of Anais Holdaway from both the session and congregation, with deep regret and sorrow.

Pulpit supply has been secured by our interim moderator, the Rev. Laura Kavanagh, up to and including Easter Sunday, and Colina Titus has found musicians for our Sunday worship until Christine Purvis' return March 18th. The faces leading worship are changing frequently but we the family of St. Andrew's remain the constant at our Sunday worship services. We are looking forward to time for fellowship at the Shrove Tuesday on Sunday Pancake Brunch February 11 following the Sunday Service. We hope to see you there.

The Rev. Laura Kavanagh is on call for any pastoral emergency until presbytery has appointed an Interim Minister who will be with us for 2 years. Please continue to uphold our congregation in prayer as we continue to worship, enjoy a time of fellowship and grow together.

Car Free Day - 2018 - June 17

Did you know we are closer to Father's Day 2018 than we are to Father's Day 2017?

We have participated in Car Free Day in Downtown Victoria for the last two years and plan to do so again this year. Last year we had well over 2,000 people enter our Sanctuary on Car Free Day - many long-time residents of Victoria who often wondered what is behind those big brown doors on the Church at the corner of Broughton and Douglas Street.

If it is a nice summer day, we can anticipate more than the 50 - 70 thousand people expected who will wander around Douglas Street.

St. Andrew's is in a very enviable placement within the Car Free Day real estate - *Front & Centre*. The only Church in the City on the main thoroughfare.

We will need volunteers to help in a number of ways – act as hosts as people come through the door, and invite people to come in and rest their 'soles'. The gateway to the front door will be one of two spots on Douglas Street to engage people in conversation, remind them of how long we have been in Victoria (over 150 years) and to extend the hand of friendship.

We will be laying claim to our customary two spots - if we don't lay claim to our customary two spots in front of the Church, we run the risk of someone else grabbing this prime piece of real estate.

We will not be providing a children's program this year as last year there were many other options to entertain the children.

We need your HELP. It is an opportunity to engage members of our congregation in a significant public event in Downtown Victoria.

Food Donations for Cedar Tree Ministries

St. Andrew's Victoria and all the other Presbyterian churches on Vancouver Island have been asked to collect non-perishable food for Cedar Tree Ministries in Duncan. The food will be distributed to those in First Nations communities who are in need.

"Cedar Tree Ministries reaches out to the Cowichan First Nations people in central Vancouver Island in partnership with Cowichan Grace Church on the Cowichan Reserve.

Along with Sunday worship, adult Bible study and a midweek children's program, CTM offers a ministry of hospitality. A weekly mid-week Sharing Day is held when free clothing is made available, along with a meal. With cultural sensitivity, CTM focuses on reconciliation, restoration, and renewal in its outreach to First Nations communities and leadership training courses.

Approximately 8,500 Indigenous people live in the Cowichan Region and over 50% are under 25 years old. Communities and families are struggling with the consequences of colonialism, poverty and inadequate housing.

Presbyterians Sharing supports the National Native Ministry Council in this important work."

Our Mission and Outreach Committee will coordinate this food donation project in our church. There will be a large grey plastic container (marked Cedar Tree Ministries) in the narthex each Sunday, beginning the first Sunday in February. Those who wish to donate to this cause can bring nonperishable items to church and deposit them in the container.

We are working on the details of how to deliver the food donations to Cedar Tree Ministries in Duncan each month.

An excerpt from the Sainsbury Memorial Message based on Romans 12: 9-21

The apostle Paul writes to the church in Rome about how the people could and should treat one another – about how they should love one another. He offers a poetic composition on how love reaches for the common good in the church. Paul says we must love authentically and genuinely – seeking to overcome evil with good and to live peaceably with all.

Genuine love is the deepest theme in this text – not just being nice to people but a moral orientation toward good. Paul is reminding us that the Christian life is all about faith working through love – that hospitality is literally love of the stranger – that our example for how to love is Jesus – to love genuinely is to love as Jesus loved.

It is the foretaste of our ultimate union with God, graciously given to us now and shared in community. When we show love toward someone, we are moving them toward God's goodness. Everything but love will pass away because God is love. The scriptures reveal that that love is real, genuine and beyond superficial human fancies. We are invited to embrace this genuine love that has the power to transform – to change lives one by one.

By the power of God's love, we are called to hospitality – to love other members of the community of faith – to love strangers and guests. Mutual love is a fundamental trait of Christian life. Whenever we open ourselves generously to others whom we do not yet know – to strangers – we may entertain angels in disguise, and this reality calls us to treat everyone as an angel in the making.

Imagine living as if the people you encounter are messengers from God, the source of insight and wisdom and the invitation to generosity and care. Each one who gathers within the embrace of our hospitality brings the presence of God with them.

We are invited to empathy – to care for those suffering in prison and those who are being oppressed – it is a call to compassion – to solidarity. There are many contexts in our society both near and far away where violence and exploitation flourish and our efforts can make a difference. We do this as an imitation of Jesus, who entered so fully into the human situation that he can sympathize with our weakness and offer the grace we truly need.

Paul makes it clear that our life is not about judgement but about honour, zeal, service, rejoicing and prayer. He tells us to love and to show that love through actions of service to the most vulnerable among us — a love that is selfless and spiritual.

New Doors!

A new set of doors has been installed at the Kirk Hall entrance, replacing the old doors which were in poor condition after 60+ years of usage and were very heavy. The initial start-up problems have been resolved and the doors are now functioning well. An automatic operator has been added to the new doors which makes it easier for those with mobility concerns, or if you have an armful of books for the bazaar or goodies for the coffee hour. These new doors were installed further out towards the street, which increased the lobby space and decreased the space available outside for overnight campers.

New Computer!

It was determined in early December that the office computer was well past its best-before date and needed to be replaced. A new computer was purchased and installed at the beginning of January. Thanks go out to Jim F., Neil K. and Whitney H. for their input on the selection of the new computer.

New Fence!

Property is participating with the owners of the Rexall property and the Broughton Square Parkade to add more security fencing between the parkade and the church. This project should be completed soon. The new gate at the back of our parking area off Broughton was a result of another cost-sharing agreement last year.

New Roof!

We had another water leak from the bell tower roof just before Christmas. This was a result of seagull debris plugging the roof drain. A special stainless steel drain guard was built and installed. It is hoped this will solve the problem. After experiencing a water leak on the south side of the balcony earlier this year, Property is getting estimates on the cost to finish the re-roofing project this year. It is essential that we have a secure roof to prevent further interior damage. Once the roof is secure we can start looking at plans to make further repairs on the interior.

New Sign!

Plans are also moving ahead to install a new church sign in the garden on the north side of the main entrance. This sign will replace all four signs on the front of the church. Those signs will be removed once the new sign is completed.



Christian Education News

The Nursery:

Three new caregivers have volunteered to work in the nursery! Therefore, we now have a total of six (pending Police Record Checks) sharing this important service to young families. As these volunteers are active in other areas of the

church, having a turn in the nursery more than monthly (September to June) can impact their ability to worship with the congregation and to fulfill other volunteer commitments. It would really help if we had *two more volunteers*. If you feel that this would be a good role for you and/or a friend, please contact me and I can explain how to go about obtaining a Police Record Check at no cost. An improved audio-system enables people to hear the service well in the nursery. When no children are present, volunteers are able to return to the sanctuary.



Adult Borrowing Library:

Books for adults to borrow are located in the Study Room, next to the main office in the church hall. Those borrowing books sign them in and out on their own, on the honour system. Dave and Patricia Rogers are the librarians and oversee the collection, helping to keep it organized and advertised. Watch for Dave's book reviews in future issues of the Link.

Children's Borrowing Libraries:




• Main Collection - The children's library is located in the large Sunday school classroom (room 201) at the end of the hallway upstairs in the Kirk Hall. Children and adults are welcome to borrow books from all of our collections, on the honour system. For the infant-toddler, children and teens' books, sign-out sheets are provided at each

place where books are on display, including in room 201. When returning books, just sign them back in, preferably from the area from which they were borrowed!

• The Bookmobile - For convenience, some of the books from the main collection are displayed by the Courtney Street exit. These books are rotated seasonally, and many are tied to the curriculum used in the Sunday school. Some of the books

are stories from the Bible. There are also Children's Bibles designed for different ages. Others are secular stories tied to holidays and the Church year. Books about nature and science are included as well.





• Books for Older Children and Teens—A small collection of books related to the Bible, holidays, Christianity, Canada, and world events, as well as chapter books (fiction) are available in the senior classroom, connected to room 201 by a folding door. A sign-out sheet is located with the books. Some of these books might be of interest to adults as well. There are several books related to Black History, for example, and February is Black History Month. The children and youth books are not just for St. Andrew's children! Feel free to borrow books to use yourself, with visiting children, or even to take with you on holidays.



Saint Valentine

Valentine was a Christian priest who lived during the third century in Rome, Italy. There are many legends about Valentine's life. One story tells about the time when the Emperor, Claudius II, outlawed marriage for young men. He believed that unmarried men would be more willing to become soldiers. Valentine secretly married young Christian couples who were in love. He was caught for breaking the law, put in prison and sentenced to death. While in custody he spent some of the time teaching the blind daughter of a jailer. One day, when Valentine was praying with the girl, she could suddenly see! Valentine later sent a note to the girl. He signed it, "From your Valentine", a message used on many valentine cards sent today.
