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

After the presbytery meeting, session will send the response to the congregation by way of the email list. After April 4th, copies will be available in the office or at the April 8th worship service. Please note that the April Presbytery meeting will be at Trinity Presbyterian, Victoria at 10:30 am; presbytery is an open court and all can attend.

On April 29, 2018 during Sunday worship we will be celebrating the sacrament of baptism. Twin baby brothers Averry and Owainn Opoku, sons of Kal Opoku and Shannon Coughlin, will be baptized. Kal has attended church at St. Andrew's during the last few months whenever the commitments of "twin" fatherhood allowed. Please join us as we welcome Owainn and Avvery, into the family of Christ at St. Andrew's.

On Sunday May 6th our annual meeting will take place immediately after the Sunday Service. Our final financial numbers for 2018 will be available

and we will be discussing among other things finishing the roof project.

Car-Free Day...

We haven't worked out the details of how Car-Free Day might unfold for St. Andrew's. But, we do know it will affect us.

Transit: In previous years BC Transit was a partner in Car-Free day and we would expect

them to be again this year. Based on previous years, with a stretch of Douglas Street being blocked off to traffic for much of the day, there will be changes in regular transit service in the downtown core.

From 8am until 8pm, buses that use Douglas Street will be re-routed onto Blanshard between Bay and Courtney Streets. Temporary stops will be set up on Blanshard, corresponding to the stop locations on Douglas.

For east-west routes, Johnson, Yates and Fort Streets will all be open, with traffic control personnel on-hand to ensure pedestrian safety.

What does Car-Free Day mean for St. Andrew's Sunday Service?

It may be difficult to get in and out of the parking lot at the Public Library. An alternative would be the View Street Parkade on View near Blanshard.

People who might normally take the bus will have to walk from Blanshard to Douglas Street to the Church.

We will need some folks to help us set up the tent in front of the

Church and possibly redirect people into the Sanctuary.

This is an opportunity to demonstrate we are a welcoming congregation by having people greet our friends and neighbours as they peek inside to learn a bit about our sanctuary and perhaps even to take a few moments for quiet and meditation.

What do we need to make this a successful St. Andrew's event?

We need volunteers to put a face to St. Andrew's. To welcome people to our doorway, share some water and information about our programs and to remind people we have been in our community for well over 150 years.

What a surprise to learn that with just three colours I could make beautiful scintillating rainbows of very hue possible! Why the Easter Bunny?

The Teutonic deity Eostra was the goddess of spring and fertility, and feasts were held in her honor on the Vernal Equinox. Her symbol was the rabbit because of the animal's high



reproduction rate.
Spring also symbolized new life and rebirth; eggs were an ancient symbol of fertility. When Roman Catholicism became the dominant

religion in Germany in the 15th century, it merged with ingrained pagan beliefs. Thus the Easter egg symbolized Jesus' resurrection. The first Easter Bunny legend was documented in the 1500s. By 1680, the first story about a rabbit laying eggs and hiding them in a garden was published. These legends were brought to the United States in the 1700s, when German immigrants settled in Pennsylvania Dutch country, according to the Center for Children's Literature and Culture. The tradition of making nests for the rabbit to lay its eggs in soon followed. Eventually, nests became decorated baskets and colorful eggs were swapped for candy, treats and other small gifts.

Donations to Cedar Tree Ministries

Saint Andrew's-Victoria and all the other Presbyterian churches on Vancouver Island have been asked to collect non-perishable food for Cedar Tree Ministries (CTM) in Duncan. The food will be distributed to those in First Nations communities who are in need.

Our Mission and Outreach Committee is co-ordinating this food donation project in our church. Jerry Verwey, Presbytery parity elder and member of St. Andrew's-Victoria, took two-and-a-half grocery bags of non-perishable food to CTM on March 14^{th} on his way to a Presbytery meeting . The next time that he will be making a delivery will be April 3^{rd} .

Besides donating non-perishable food items, you can purchase gift cards from Save-on-Foods grocery stores and donate these to Cedar Tree Ministries. The cards are used to buy fresh vegetables and meat. Save-on-Foods is the biggest grocery store in Duncan so that is why the gift cards should be purchased from there. Any gift cards for CTM can be left with Whitney in the church office.




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Ex Libris Ecclesiae - Intercessory Prayer, by Dutch Sheets. Regal Publishing, 1996.



I hasten to bring this recently donated book to your attention. When I was on the board of Saanich Baptist Church (before St. Andrew's), this is one of the books we elders read and discussed together.

An assigned reading from Dutch Sheets might raise an eyebrow. Isn't he a wild-eyed

charismatic preacher? (No, not very wild in the eyes, but definitely in the charismatic camp.) Why would elders in a conservative Baptist church choose to read Sheets?

Several things commended this book to us back then, and to us Presbyterians now, starting with Sheets' breezy and positive style. And back when I first read it, as now while preparing this review, I liked his command of the literature on prayer. Two examples:

I agree with E.M. Bounds when he said, "God shapes the world by prayer. The more prayer there is in the world, the better the world will be..."

Charles Spurgeon said, "By perseverance the snail reached the ark."

Mostly, though, Sheets writes with the smell of the smoke of battle in his clothes. This man prays, and his life of prayer is what gives the book such punch.

One of Sheets' insights has stayed with me since I first read *Intercessory Prayer*. He points out that God gave us humans dominion over the earth; that's the lesson from the Garden of Eden; it means (says Sheets) that when God wanted to achieve something on Earth, He planned to do it through those whom He placed in charge here. But wait! After we turned to sin, did God take our dominion away? No, nothing about that in the Bible. We have ruined the planet pretty much, but we still have God-given dominion over it.

So when God wants to achieve something on Earth nowadays, he *still* expects to work through us. That is why our prayers are so important to God: when we ask God to intervene and do something for us, we

enable Him to work through proper channels, so to speak — to come down and work on the earth *in concert with* those whom He placed in charge locally. In *that* sense, the achievement of God's will still depends on *our* prayers.

The only weakness that stands out to me in this book is how Sheets plays rather loose with dictionaries and lexicons to support his points. This is called "illegitimate totality transfer" or "lexical fallacy" (you can Google that to see what I mean, if you like doing armchair theology). While lexical fallacies are the preferred method for changing the meaning of the Bible, so that it appears to agree with your opinions, I hasten to Sheets' defence by saying that Sheets does not go that way. His conclusions remain in line with Scripture.

To enliven and enlarge your personal prayer life, try reading Sheets. As far as I see, it is the only book on intercessory prayer, or on any kind of prayer, in our library.
