

The Presbytery Group tasked with finding St. Andrew's an Interim Minister is contacting possible candidates and the hope is that we will have someone here by early summer.

Car Free Victoria will be held June 17, 2018. St. Andrew's will be participating for the third time and this year Jim Ferguson is in the "driver's seat". Please let Jim know if you are willing to join in the fun. Jim will be contacting other Presbyterian churches in Victoria to see if they would like to participate.

Please mark June 10th on your calendar for the Church Picnic which will be held after the Sunday Service. This year the picnic will take a slightly different form, but it will still mark the end of the 2017-2018 Sunday School year and we will all have the opportunity to visit, have fun, and enjoy Victoria's wonderful Beacon Hill Park. Stay tuned for further details.

The Reverend Jeremy Bellsmith has accepted a call to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Nanaimo. He will be inducted Sunday, June 10, 2018. According to the settlement agreement we will now be responsible for paying him 50% of the total amount of the cost of stipend and housing which would have been provided to him for the balance of the transition period. We wish the Bellsmith family well in their new call.

After Pentecost Sunday, May 20, 2018, we will be entering the liturgical season of "ordinary time". The liturgical colour for the season is green, the colour of hope and growth. Let us pray for God's guiding spirit as we enter a new season at St. Andrew's.



Five Beliefs That Set Presbyterians Apart from Other Protestant Christians

Presbyterians generally exhibit their faith through acts of generosity, hospitality, the constant pursuit of social justice and reform, as well as proclamation the gospel of Christ. But, so do many other denominations.

Below are five beliefs [copied from the Internet courtesy of Mr. Google, so it must be true?] that set Presbyterians apart from the other Protestant Christians.

1. Governing Body: The Presbyterian Church governing body is based on a system of elders. Teaching and ruling elders, or ministers, are ordained and responsible for the discipline, nurture and mission of the local congregation. The practicalities of buildings, finance and temporal ministry to the needy in the congregation are delegated to a group of officers called deacons.

2. Doctrine: Presbyterianism is historically a "confessional" type tradition. Confessional churches express their faith in the form of "confessions of faith." In confessional churches, theology is not solely an individual matter. While individuals are encouraged to understand scripture, and may challenge the current institutional understanding, theology is carried out by the community as a whole. It is this community understanding of theology that is expressed in confessions.

3. Education: Presbyterians put an emphasis on equal education for all people. In times past when Presbyterians arrived in a new place, they would usually build a church, a school, and a hospital, in that order. Presbyterians see the right to worship of God as paramount, and education as necessary, so that they can serve the world in God's name.

4. Majority Rule: When Presbyterians have a policy or an action to consider, they pray, they talk, and then they vote. In fact, Presbyterians probably take more votes than any other religious group. They believe that the Holy Spirit lives in individuals but works through the community. Because of this lay and clergy votes count the same.

5. Sacraments: Presbyterians traditionally have held the worship position that there are only two sacraments: Baptism and Communion. Presbyterians baptize infants as well as unbaptized adults by sprinkling or pouring water, rather than immersion. Infants are baptized on the biblical belief that because Hebrew infants were circumcised in order to show that they were part of the covenant community, infants of believing parents should likewise be baptized. The ritual of communion, also known as partaking of the Lord's Supper, is based on the belief that Christ is present in the bread and wine through the Holy Spirit.

The Property Committee has identified a number of items which are no longer needed at St.

There is a three-piece sectional wooden stationary/filing cabinet assessed at \$275. There is also another two-piece cabinet with textured glass doors that was assessed at \$600.



Mason bees are native pollinators in our Victoria neighbourhoods and they make their nests in long, hollow shelters, roughly the diameter of a pencil. The volunteer builders of St. Andrew's rolled rectangles of paper around pencils (like rolling cigarettes in the olden days!) and stuffed them into small metal cans.

By hanging these condos in bushes or trees in your garden, you provide homes for these busy workers who will fertilize your fruit and vegetable crops and generally make the world a better place for us all to live in. This is certainly showing good stewardship for God's great creation and a fitting thing to do for Earth Day!





Bible Verse of the Month: Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Matthew 28:19

The Parable of the Seeds

Jesus used the parable of the seeds to teach people about following God's message. The parable tells the story of a farmer sowing seeds. Some of the seeds fell on the path and were eaten by birds. Other seeds fell on some rocks where the seeds sprouted quickly, but because they did not grow good roots to help them stay strong and wet, they withered and died. Some of the seeds fell among the weeds and thorns, and were soon choked out. The seeds that fell into the tilled soil grew into strong plants. Jesus teaches us not to be like the seeds that fell in the path, as just as soon as such people hear God's message it is snatched away by other ideas. The seeds that fell on some rocks are like people who forget all about God's way when it is difficult to do what God wants them to do. The seeds that fell in with the weeds and thorns are like people who believe in God, but then their wanting other things chokes out God's message. The seeds that fell on good soil refer to people who hear God's message, and obey it. They bear abundant fruit to God's glory.
