Recently several have asked about my title as “Interim Pastor”. The comments have suggested that “Interim” seems to refer to “a holding pattern” or a place of “standing still”. A bit of research as to the meaning of the word seems to validate this perception! According to Mr. Webster, “The word “Interim” refers to gap, hiatus, discontinuity, hiccup, interlude, intermission, interruption, short-term, or temporary.” Definitely not a good place to be! This is not my understanding of or the way that I function within the “interim” role. To me this is not a “standing still” or “place-holder” position merely going through the motions of worship and ministry until a permanent pastor is called down the road.

My role and functioning embraces the role of “transitional ministry”. Again Mr. Webster clarifies. The word “transitional” refers to a passage, movement, or change from one condition, or place, to another. We at St. Andrew's have entered an exciting and busy process of transition and I am blessed to be the transitional leader of that process.

Interim ministry once upon a time focused more on merely maintaining worship, pastoral care, Bible studies, etc. as a new permanent pastor was sought. Many of you are aware that one of my roles has been to serve on the faculty at 3 of the sites around the Presbyterian Church (USA) that provide interim ministry training for clergy interested in learning how to serve as a transitional leader. So misunderstood was the title and role of interim that the training is now called Transitional Ministry Education to broaden the idea that all churches in today's culture are “transitional” in nature and scope. We are all in transition whether we are searching for a permanent pastor or not!

In addition to preaching, pastoral care, administration, Bible studies, etc., my role is to guide you in a transitional process with the steps clearly identified. Those Focus Points of Transitional Ministry include the direction of our work in the two years ahead:

Heritage

- ♦ Create Safe Spaces to Articulate Defining Stories
- ♦ Create Broader Sense of Identity, Meaning, Purpose

Mission

- ♦ Focus on Core Values Where Are We? Where Are We Going?
- ♦ Clarify Identity – Focuses on Discernment/Discussion of Future Mission

Connections

- ♦ Discover ALL the connections/relationships a Faith Community has ie., Ecumenical/Interfaith
- ♦ Update Technology
- ♦ Grow in Awareness of Connections Who is our Neighbour?

Leadership

- ♦ Assess What Leadership is Required to Meet Congregations Mission
- ♦ Honour Those Who Have Faithfully Served
- ♦ Gift Identification – Leadership Development

Future

- ♦ Call for Ongoing/Future Oriented Expression Of Congregation's Core

You may wonder as you attend church each Sunday morning who makes the various improvements to our sanctuary that continue happening. Under normal circumstances I would be wondering about that as well, but I have the advantage of actually knowing.

It is not because I have been told, but because I have seen it occur on a regular basis.



You see, I daily walk between the Broughton St. Parkade and my office and in so doing, pass the Broughton side door (the Victoria Ballet entrance) and the front of the sanctuary. Over the past year I have seen Jerry Verwey painting the trim on the window ledges on the Broughton side windows, sanding and staining the massive front doors of the main church entrance on Douglas St., and painting the door-stops.



Some days I saw the evidence of a lot of hard work on the steps – a pile of shavings and sawdust, which on my next pass-by would be neatly tidied up. The next day the ironwork on the doors would be gone and the doors would be sanded down to their original pre-stained colour. This occurred over some days. I happened past one day and found Jerry putting the finishing touches on the sanding of the front doors. Apparently the hardest part was not the sanding of the flat surfaces, but getting the former stain out from between the grooves on the planks that make up the doors. It is painstaking work but for Jerry it appears to be a labour of love.

So the next time you see our sanctuary being lovingly maintained you might recognize that volunteers like Jerry Verwey are working hard in the service of God and for the benefit of our congregation.

Finding my Home

It seems every day I am having more insights into the ways this new adventure of moving into a retirement home is impacting on my life. You'd think you'd just walk in, get your room and suddenly all would be well.

Mostly, it is, but health problems do persist, probably because of anxiety that you do not really recognize. Your mind and body can only handle so much.

Today, I went to church. It has been my focus of most of my life. My earliest memories of myself are of singing in the children's church choir. And oh, how I loved to sing — and sing I did — and I kept singing right through my life until finally I could no longer night drive to rehearsals and my hearing was beginning to fail. I still mourn the fact that Sunday mornings I am not up front with the hymnbook in my hand.

I am often feeling a bit lost. My old house is not really my home and my small room with its delightful view, tiny bed, computer and TV are more than enough to fill my days, but it will take longer to adapt to than I had realized at first ... It still seems a little unnatural.

But today, I walked into the church—the same church I have attended for a very long time. The church where I had helped choose the paint colours for the sanctuary. The church whose pews I had dusted many times. The church that helped us celebrate our fiftieth wedding anniversary by renewing our wedding vows; and the church four years later that joined together with me to say our goodbyes to my husband. Yes, the memories came flooding back as I walked through the door and

then it hit me... THIS is my home! Everything else I have ever occupied has been a residence. This is my home!

So, a new page has been turned in this book about my life. It is easier now to accept that whatever change takes place during my stay here, I will always have a permanent home at the church; maybe not physically but my thoughts and memories will have a lifelong association with those wonderful people who have shaped my life in so many ways.

And another thing I have noticed is that, in small ways, I have been reaching out to others and they have been reaching back. I see someone having difficulty walking and ask if they need an arm to help them... They reply negatively or positively but there is an opportunity to share, and most people here love to share... They are a bit lonely, yet have lived such amazing lives that I feel really privileged to hear their memories.

Even the staff is a storehouse of stories. They don't share much about their personal lives, but their warm hugs and sweet smiles tell you that they are full of love. Yes, there are the not-so-friendly ones but 99.9% of them are really loveable.

So yes, another building block to this journey has been recognized. It will be impossible to make my room into much more than a sanctuary to rest in... It's a good place, yes, but they say "home is where your heart is" and I guess mine will always be at my church!

Open Church Report

Since the start of the tourist season in mid-June until the end of September we have had 32 open church days, including two concert days. We have welcomed as few as 25 and as many as 100 on any given day. Many thanks go to Dave Rogers who faithfully attended during July and August when he not only acted as tour guide but also demonstrated the power and versatility of our organ. Thanks also go to the many volunteers: the Dukes, Jim Ferguson, Peter Lewis, Jim Kempling and others who came to be a part of the two-hour open church. This year, I have tried to schedule the open church days when we had cruise ships in for long enough to allow passengers some time ashore and at a time when other attractions (e.g. dinner etc.) would not be foremost in their preference. We welcomed about 20% from cruise ships and the remainder from either locals, who had seen the church but our doors were shut, or from outside visitors. We welcomed people from Germany, Australia, Switzerland, Croatia, Taiwan, China, New Zealand, France, Mexico, Brazil, The Netherlands, South Africa, Japan, Spain, Scotland, England, Ireland, and all parts of the USA and Canada.

Many appreciated the opportunity to see our historic sanctuary, listen to our organ, and to take some time for reflection and meditation.

There will be four more open church days in October to coincide with cruise ship arrivals before they all depart for sunnier climes.

Session has agreed to continue open church through November and December, every Wednesday from 11 to 1pm. Volunteers are more than welcome.

Treasurer's Report - Sept 27, 2018

As we are nearing the end of a very eventful 2018, it is appropriate to give a very brief update to our congregation on our financial status to this point.

The past year has been a year of change for our congregation, and despite the turmoil and uncertainty, we have survived, and I am pleased to report that despite the **downdrafts... we have held our own (financially) and that is a good sign for the coming year(s).**

Unfortunately, a number of our congregante members decided to move on and not participate any longer in the life of the St. Andrew's congregation. **On this matter, I don't wish to act as the bean counter... but I will estimate that at this point we are down about 25% - 30% in congregation size and participation from a year ago while the financial support has fallen off by about 8 – 9 %.** While we are still in a deficit operating position, and that was anticipated, our reserves will carry us through this trough.

I have seen an eagerness to revive much of the pent-up **energy from the many working groups at St. Andrews's and we will soon start to see the results of some of that new found energy.** The tackling of some of the long-ignored painting and updating of the hallways and offices in the Kirk Hall are a welcome sight. Some needed work on the organ keyboards (a project on hold for about three or four years) is underway. And **of course, the roof... the ever present and needy roof repair is now well underway, and should be complete by mid October.**

I am now beginning work on the 2019 budget process and as each of us in our own way examines how we can participate **in the work at St. Andrew's, I could not let this opportunity** pass without reminding all to consider the financial support needed for 2019. Consider using PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) as it is an excellent vehicle to use in expediting and meeting your financial commitments in support of the next 12 – 18 months. Aside from the obvious increased givings resulting from a committed and consistent contribution and predictability of the same, the offset benefits of reduced workload for the counters and necessary record keeping are most obvious.

We have three months remaining in 2018 and I would encourage each and every one to consider how we can take steps to make up the shortfall from last year and work together to achieve the modest targets we need to agree to for 2019.

A Book Review from the St. Andrew's Church Library



Dietrich Bonhoeffer: Letters & Papers from Prison, The Enlarged Edition. Edited by Eberhard Bethge. Touchstone (an imprint of Simon & Schuster), 1971.

I trust that the Lutheran minister Dietrich Bonhoeffer needs no introduction for anyone who attends St. Andrew's. I have observed over the years that Bonhoeffer is the only 20th-century Christian leader who gets mentioned favourably alongside Mother Theresa. Since I want to speak about this collection of his **letters, I'll leave you to Wikipedia for the particulars of his life.**

Eberhard Bethge was a student of Bonhoeffer, and many of the letters in this compilation were addressed to him. Bethge also produced the first (1951) edition of *Letters & Papers from Prison*. That slim volume was mainly **Bonhoeffer's theological musings while in Tegel, a Nazi prison.** Among my circle as a young believer in Vancouver, *Letters & Papers from Prison* was considered a must-read for every follower of Christ. I still remember parts of it 50 years later.

This recently-donated copy for our church library is indeed **"greatly enlarged."** I would say it is three times the size of the original, and that may be an issue – the theological impact of the slim first edition may be diluted. The old **edition's letters are all here of course, but the extra material may shift the focus from one's personal life 'when the chips are down' to the life of Bonhoeffer.**

Anyway, you can be the judge of that. *Letters & Papers from Prison* should be on every **believer's bucket list. If you have not read it yet, now is your chance.**

Lunchtime Recital Series

September 5th



A dear friend invited me to go along with her to the Lunchtime Recital on September 5th and then out for lunch following. I am really glad she did. I enjoyed it immensely. It featured Christine Purvis on the organ and Antonia Mahon on the flute.

The program the ladies performed was quite diverse with compositions dating from the 1600's to present day. And the composers were from England, the U.S., France and Germany. And of the six composers, one was a female.

The duo began the program with the German composer, Johann Pachelbel's, Canon in D. Little is known about the circumstances of the Canon's composition however it is believed to have been composed in the 1680's. It is a beautiful composition that has stood the test of time and Antonia and Christine mostly certainly did it justice.

My favourite piece was the Pastorale composed by modern day American composer, Charles Callahan. His style has been described as "gentle, confident lyricism", and I think that is exactly how it was played by the ladies. However, a close second was the piece by female composer Cecile Chaminade titled Meditation. It was very musical and very representative of "late Romantic French music."

English composer, John Rutter's Suite Antique, concluded the program. He is the composer that was commissioned to write a new anthem for the wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton. Obviously a very highly regarded composer!

All in all it was a very pleasant way to spend the noon hour. I would recommend that you don't miss the next concert in the series. Save the date – Wednesday, November 7th at 12:15 to 12:45.

In 2009, Simon Sinek started a movement to help people become more inspired at work, and in turn inspire their colleagues and customers. Since then, millions have been touched by the power of his ideas, including more than **28 million who've watched his TED Talk based on START WITH WHY** -- the third most popular TED video of all time.

Sinek starts with a fundamental question: Why are some people and organizations more innovative, more influential, and more profitable than others? 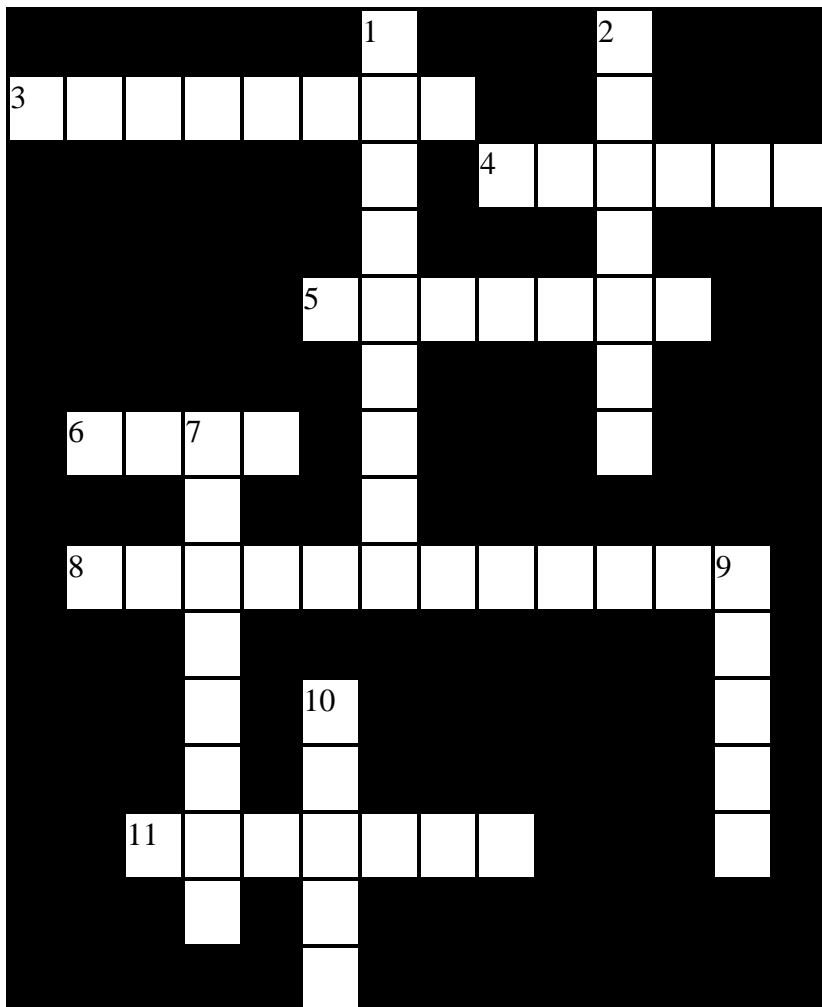
