Within a few days we will celebrate our 7th anniversary! The middle of February marks the 7th month since beginning my tenure as Transitional Pastor at St. Andrews. There are no other words other than "Thank you! Blessings to each of you for your gracious acceptance, kindness and support." Unfortunately, the anniversary will come and go while I am away teaching Transitional Ministry Education at a Presbyterian Retreat

Center in New Mexico from February 14 - 23. During the 9 days that I am away, I will have the opportunity of serving on the transitional ministry faculty at one of the sites where Interim Ministry is taught to ministers considering adding that specialty to their skill-set. Recently another minster who works with churches that are between pastors indicated that a church had told him they were reluctant to name an interim pastor because too many felt that the role was nothing more than a place-holder type ministry until a permanent pastor could be called. A "place holder minister" is one that preaches on Sunday, moderates the Session, offers pastoral care and other weekly and regular activities. Many Presbyterian clergy nearing retirement who have this concept of interim ministry are greatly disappointed to discover that interim ministry most often is made up of 100% of the ministry functions of the previous minister and 80% more "transitional" tasks.

St. Andrew's has been a faithful partner these 7 months in understanding and committing to the critical work of the transitional process. As I have mentioned in this place before, over the coming interim period, our work will center upon The Five Focus Points of Transitional Ministry which includes:

Heritage Mission Leadership Connections Future

Perhaps they appear as mere words or random descriptors, yet over the coming months, they will begin to take focus and direct our work. Heritage is synonymous with birthright, inheritance, legacy, and tradition. We have been shaped by our history, and we need to know, appreciate and celebrate that heritage. On the other hand, we must recognize those parts of the past that are best not to carry into the future. The interim period offers an opportunity to establish clarity about what will move forward and what will be left behind. It also vital that we have a chance to experience grieving and healing. We must work on discarding old expectations, wounds, patterns, and baggage of the past.

I am guiding Session in beginning the process of looking for new and more effective ways to communicate among themselves and with the congregation as a whole. We will focus on rebuilding trust among ourselves, within Session and with the Presbytery. These are crucial components in stabilizing our faith community and the relationships that are the bedrock of God's work within us as together we clarify our future. I covet your prayers for myself as your Transitional Minister and for us as a congregation as we do the difficult work in becoming introspective and reflective and asking the most basic of questions: "Who are we?" and "Who do we believe God wants us to be?" Together we trust God's work within us.

Notes from Session

On January 15, session held its first meeting for 2019. Guided by Reverend Coggin we spent time ascertaining what we determined were the top priorities for 2019. We will continue to work on this in February.

As you know, every year two churches in the Presbytery of Vancouver Island are invited to send a Commissioner to General Assembly. This year we have been asked to appoint a member of session to be a Commissioner. Jerry Verwey has been appointed to attend General Assembly held June 2 - 6, 2019, at Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, ON.

You will have noticed over the past few months that the friendly and smiling face of Grant Shepard has been missing around the church. Unfortunately, Grant sustained a shoulder injury around the time of the 2018 Bazaar and has been unable to work. He is at present covered under Work Safe by the Province of BC. Grant has been a valued employee of St. Andrew's for close to 20 years and we are working with him to ensure that he receives the proper care and coverage during his recovery. We pray that he will once again be tending to St. Andrew's "old bones". Many thanks go to David Garson and Jerry Verwey who are attempting to fill Grant's shoes in his absence.

Now that the roof project has been finished it is time for us to turn to other capital projects. The stained-glass windows are starting to slump and will need some attention. It was suggested that at the cost of no more than \$5,000 someone be commissioned to look at the windows and determine which ones are at risk and what needs to be done to stabilize the windows. The Presbyterian Church in Canada (PCC) has designated February 3 as "Presbyterian World Service & Development Sunday" – a day when churches across Canada are invited to celebrate some of the work carried out by our denomination around the world. In St. Andrew's, this Sunday will mark the beginning of a month of educating ourselves on the work of PWS&D, and of responding to what we have learned.

What is PWS&D?

It is the development and relief agency of the PCC through which we have actively worked to serve marginalized and vulnerable people around the world for over 70 years. In doing this, we demonstrate our commitment to Christ's message of love through justice, poverty reduction and support in times of disaster. Funds are raised directly through donations from congregations/individuals, and through government grants.

How is it different from Presbyterians Sharing?

Presbyterians Sharing supports the overall mission and ministry of the PCC in Canada and abroad. At St. Andrew's, we commit an allocation through our annual budget, recommended by the PCC based on our annual income from donations. Together, the two programs support the one mission of The PCC.

Where do PWS&D funds go?

Projects support food security, livelihoods, health, human rights, refugees and emergency relief around the world. In 2017, \$3.8 million went to supporting 56 projects in 24 countries through 33 long-term development projects (62% of total funds) and 23 emergency response projects (24%), with the balance used for involvement with networks and coalitions with the same objectives as us (4%). A further 7% was used for education about the work of PWS&D, and only 3% was used for administration costs.

How can I help?

As in the recent past, we are aiming to raise \$2,000 through February for the important work of this branch of our national church. As recommended by PWS&D, our givings will not be designated to any specific project so that they can be allocated by PWS&D to the greatest need (such as an unexpected natural disaster). If you are able to donate, please make this incremental to your regular givings and mark it as such on your weekly envelope; if you use PAR, please use the special envelopes in the pews, or pick one up in the narthex.

How can I learn more about PWS&D?

We will spend a few minutes in each service through February to hear about a specific program. There is also an excellent PWS&D web page with information (https://presbyterian.ca/pwsd/), including a monthly newsletter (https://presbyterian.ca/pwsd/category/newsletters/). 


A Blast from the Past

Dick and Stella Higgins and Dick's brother, Bill, pictured on 10 February 1945. This was Stella's first full day in Victoria having arrived by air from Halifax the previous day. She had left her home on 9 January never dreaming it would be a month before she reached her new home. She had spent 19 days on a small former freighter with her 8 month old baby daughter in the middle of a convoy on its way to New York. With so many women and small children jammed in a small space it was not long before viruses were spread resulting in the baby's illness. The last few days at sea in the approach to Halifax were unaccompanied by any naval vessel. The day following the ship's docking everyone was disembarked and glad to be on dry land again. Stella had to take her ill baby to the Children's Hospital while she was accommodated by Canada's Immigration Dept. Desperate to get away from there she tried to get to Victoria by some faster method than by train. After ten days she was allowed to sign the baby out of the hospital. Having made the necessary arrangements, she flew all the way across the country (with a few stops) to be met by Dick in Vancouver where he was being discharged from the RCAF.

The bag in her hand contained some tangerines spotted in a shop and eagerly purchased after so many years of no such luxury.
